How would you describe your art?

Sculptural paintings of high impasto relief.

How long have you been an artist and how did you become an artist?

My whole life I've been drawing and shut off from society, without a TV growing up, and wished many times not to have this creative gene that seems to bring social unrelating and financial challenge. Yet I still do what's true to me: searching for that one place where I can be me.



My guy says Talent is what you are born with, and Skill is something you develop. I went to school for Graphic Design but found less meaning in that. Went to Fine Art for passion, but not knowing the way of money instead of waiting on galleries and their long lists to decide my future, I put up my own websites to showcase my fine art work utilizing my graphic design skills.

Then found myself with a serious health issue where I was off work for a year—that gave me time to do all these tests with the thick paint and do what I've always been wanting. It literally gave me something exciting to wake up to... to see how the paint has dried now with the color shift gone.

What is your favorite medium and why?

I have not been able to find the end of discoveries with this thick paint (impasto) and the more I think about it and find new things this paint can do, the more I see personality traits that line this acrylic medium up with who I am.

I want to create a Personality Medium Test to help people find their medium faster, based on their personality characteristics. For example, like this medium, I am complex. Just when I think I've learned myself/this medium, it shows a new side, like almost requiring an assembly line of canvases to use the extra paint mixed. I often find myself doing multiple things while one is drying.

The medium does amazing wonders but takes a long time to set up, just like how I boot up slowly in the morning. This medium is also for those who like to plan ahead and can see past its color shift. I like to plan out my environments in advance and have a plan for most paintings before I create them, rather than just paint on the fly.

What are some of the challenges in working in your preferred medium?



Major color shift is about the only drawback of this thicker paint medium. Deep blue turns a literal 20 shades lighter to a light blue as the Gel becomes milky white then dries clear, returning the blue to its original deep color after drying. So how to visualize the right colors in front of you when they appear totally different? I have found I can take some mixed Gel with paint color and put a

swipe on the bottle I use to hold the extra mix, then tape over the swipe of paint while wet, so that it dries the

right color right there on the bottle. That way, I know what shade it will dry to when thinking of what colors to use. The tape is for keeping the dried piece of paint on the bottle... when squeezing the bottle, the paint swipe tends to fall off when dry.





Pick one work of art from your Art Colony portfolio and tell us the story behind it. Why does this piece have meaning to you? What steps did you take to create the piece?

"The \$500 Paint Palette." I have so many works of art, each with a description on its own page here at this site, so I would like to talk about the palette that makes the actual art and how different it is. I continually find new forms on the palette that I have to then transfer to a canvas. It started back when I hid 5 \$100 bills in my

palette, then poured old paint over them. I didn't care for banks back then and wanted to save literal cash, so disguised the money right out in plain site. No one knew. This became one valuable palette I made sure wasn't discarded over time!

Then little sister, Debbie, came down to visit from out of state and we needed some extra cash to do stuff. So out came my secret. It was a thrill to hear her reaction: "What? Hidden money in your palette? Won't the paint have stuck to the paper bill? How will you be able to find the bills if lost in the paint? What if you cut into the money & make it unusable?" I carefully felt then cut with exacto knife along the edges to reveal a safe bill rolled in ziplock bag. That was the most fun to see her eyes open in surprise!



Before that, my other sister, Esther, would excitedly ask me if she could peel the paint off the palette this time. Now I have found a way to use this paint-skin peeled off as a palette itself, or cut up into a myriad of uses to add back into a painting.



Tell us about one medium, technique or style that you would like to try working with (that you have not tried before) and why you would like to try this.

I just discovered this Crystal Mortar that is a clear gel with texture, not an opaque gritty paste, but gritty that dries clear, which means with just a hint of color added, all kinds of colorful crystals could be made, added to jellyfish strings, or a colorful cave discovery. I sent away for 2 of these outrageously expensive and tiny jars with that rare feeling of you being the only one to discover the next gold and what can be done with it, but no one knows, and it's eating you up inside with excitement!

How do you make time for art?

By being child-free and choosing the life I want that has fewer sacrifices than those sacrifices that have already been taken from me, and by staying part-

time at the real job to have time enough to find that which would be fulfilling to me. It is hard to see everyone else move up in life doing what I could not force myself to, and now they have all these things and a better life because of it, but I had to stay true to myself and visions. I am happier doing something creative for myself most every day.

If you could imagine the "perfect art day" for yourself, what would it be like?

Wow, it would definitely have to be working in the environment this medium seems to take. I do wonder at its full potential, which seems to need an assembly line in a large warehouse, with 4 tables laid out in a square fashion.

Multiple canvases are already laid out for 30 people, but it's just me, or 1 artist managing this. There is a rollable paint rack, brush and palette center that just moves along this table of canvases as I paint backgrounds and use up extra paint that took a while to mix once, but can now be used on many canvases without waste. In the center of the tables are rows and rows of stackable organizing boxes to hold these completed paintings flat to dry without any dust settling on them.

As I complete each painting going around the room, they are placed in these drying racks. From drying (I'd have a team to set this all up), I'd go to photographing them, then to a gallery/auction room where sales people sell them.

I basically would like a peaceful environment to do art that is large enough to see the possibilities of what all this thick paint can do, and quiet enough to enjoy it and be inspired, and to share that with others who respect and are looking for the same. To be allowed to create without restraint. I wonder what that would be like. I guess we all would, but I don't want to live my life in wonder, rather than actually living it.

If you could spend 24 hours with one artist, living or historical, who would you want to spend the day with and why? What would the two of you do?

Well Van Gogh was the only impasto artist I know of in history, but I would ask him nothing about art and mostly about his mental state. "What the heck were you thinking cutting off your ear? Don't you know there are more things in life than just art?! You can get attention by being involved in others lives!"

Maybe it would be cool to make a movie on bringing Van Gogh back to the future, to show him how thick they make gels and pastes of today, and how the drying time of oils is down to 2-4 days touch-dry now.

I might hang out with <u>Ev McTaggart</u> on the Art Colony here, who has already said we could challenge each other to a thick paint duel with referee! I know some kind of paint would go flying.

I saw <u>Elizabeth Jane Letourneau's</u> crackle paste samples and got all excited at trying a whole new medium (google eyes)! My BF just rolls his eyes.

A camera helps to capture the moment so that when you do go to paint it, you can look back many times to remember what it looked like. A camera can also get your whole canvas in the picture a scanner can't, if you have bigger work. Taking the art out in the sunlight will get the best lighting.

It killed me for so long to not have a camera with me to capture "all the different scenes or settings" as you call it, and a camera with quality. A dear friend finally helped me into a smartphone that is a camera & cell phone in one, & has been such a blessing so far for just the very thing you mentioned. Looks very beautiful, Wanda, just imagining all the colors that you saw. Good job still!
